this first volume of what will be a full scale portrait presents ezra pound as a very determined and energetic young genius setting out to make his way both as a poet and as a force for civilization in england and america in the years before during and just after the 1914 18 war in a clear and lively narrative a david moody weaves a story of pound s early life and loves of his education in america of his apprentice years in london devoted to training himself to be as a good and powerful a poet as he had it in him to become of his learning there from w b yeats and ford madox hueffer then forming his own imagiste group and going on from that to join with wyndham lewis in his vorticism and to link up also with james joyce and t s eliot to create the modernist vortex in the midst of the 1914 18 war we see pound scraping a living by writing prose for individualist and socialist periodicals and emerging as not only an inspired literary critic but as a critic of music and society as well above all moody shows pound s evolution as a poet from the derivative idealism and aestheticism of his precocious youth into the truly original author of homage to sextus propertius and hugh selwyn mauberley we find pound established by 1920 as a force for revolution in poetry as a force for the liberation of the individual from stifling conventions and as a force for renaissance in america we find him becoming committed moreover to the reform of the capitalist system in the name of economic justice for all this is the first biography to put pound s poetry at the heart of his existence where he himself placed it and to view his extraordinarily active life his loves and his creative effort as a single complex drama the altogether new and comprehensive account of all of his poems from the earliest through cathay and up to hugh selwyn mauberley and the first cantos will illuminate his poetry and make it more accessible with that there is an exceptionally clear and cogent analysis of the ideas informing his imagisme and his vorticism and of the ideas informing his commitments to the freedom and fulfilment of the individual to a cultural renaissance and to social and economic reform the poetry the prose writings and the personal life are all woven together into a brilliant narrative portrait of the poet as a young man the second volume the epic years carries on the narrative of his life and works from 1921 the year in which he took up residence in paris i am not a poet yet i trek on the poetic trail the motive is precise the expression is relaxed mind me for my errors i beg pardon in advance i am not a poet yet strive to sing the carols of my thoughts i hope they touch you i hope they express the inexpressive i hope you hear them say all that is not said yet i am not a poet is a series of thoughts that reflects the social and internal idiosyncrasies which each one of us goes through it is not a pedantic read or a lover s parody but reflections on the real life from the eyes of the author an awakened dreamer who doesn t want to leave her dreamland yet wants to stay close to reality she depicts the aberrations of the customary life through her art and unfolds the thought that went behind it she touches upon multi varied dichotomies in life that starts with tracing a woman's journey then dwelling into explaining the internal and external conflicts of an individual s convictions in the denouement of the narrative the author expresses her own journey as an artist it largely supports the notion of self reflection and acceptance that calling at once religious ethical and aesthetic is one that only a genuine poet can hear and very few poets can explain it as compellingly as mr wiman does that gift is what makes ambition and survival not just one of the best books of poetry criticism in a generation but a spiritual memoir of the first order new york sun this weighty first prose collection should inspire wide attention partly because of wiman s current job partly because of his astute insights and partly because he mixes poetry criticism with sometimes shocking memoir the collection's greatest strength comes in general ruminations on the writing reading and judging poetry publishers weekly wiman is a terrific personal essayist as this new collection illustrates with the command and instincts of the popular memoirist this is a brave and bracing book booklist blazing high style is how the new york times describes the prose of christian wiman the
